2 LinTek awards

2.1 LinTek's educational award, the Golden Carrot

The aim of LinTek's educational award, the Golden Carrot, is to encourage and highlight good educators who inspire and motivate the students at LiTH.

All science and engineering student sections may nominate a teacher who has demonstrated good teaching practice in the last calendar year. The criteria on which the nominees are judged are commitment, teaching skills and teaching methods in relation to the subject. The Union Board appoints the responsible person as well as the jury. The jury should consist of three to five people with a good understanding of teaching, at least one of whom should be from outside LinTek.

Several parameters will be taken into account to determine the winner of the Golden Carrot. These will include the nomination texts submitted by the science and engineering sections, course appraisals, course evaluations and any previous nominations. Additional assessment criteria may include interviews with students who have had the nominated teacher.

The winner of the award will receive a trophy, a glass carrot and a cash prize, which will be presented in a ceremony in the spring.

2.2 Commitment Scholarship

The purpose of the Commitment Scholarship is to encourage students or student organisations who, through their voluntary commitment, have brought about long-term improvements in student life. The non-profit work could, for example, relate to education, collaboration, the environment or gender equality.

All students at LiU can nominate the student/student organisation that has brought about long-term improvements in student life through voluntary work. The nomination period is determined by the Commercial Officer, who also appoints and convenes the jury.

The prize is awarded ceremonially in the spring.

3 Cooperation with external parties on awards

In cases where there is cooperation with external parties on awards, the cooperation will be documented through an agreement. The agreement must clearly state what the external parties and LinTek undertake to do.
